EXAM AND GRADING

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- Portfolio exam
 - 4-hours, take-home assignment

THE PORTFOLIO EXAM

1. Individual written assignments submitted during the teaching period
 - **5 ECTS courses:** at least two assignments; **10 ECTS courses:** at least three assignments
 - Assignments are broadly described in the course description (<https://coursecatalogue.au.dk>) – it is important to stick to them!
 - Students receive feedback during the course
 2. Upload all assignments together in a revised and finalized version for grading after the teaching has finished
 - Grading is based **exclusively** on uploaded portfolio
 - The assignments during the teaching period function as drafts/works-in-progress towards writing the final portfolio
 - The maximum length of the finalized portfolio is stated in your course description
- **Portfolio submission deadline:** Friday after last class @ 12 (noon) CEST, via wiseflow



THE 4-HOURS, TAKE-HOME EXAM

- Students participate in a number of compulsory activities throughout the course
 - Requirements for each activity are stated in your course description (<https://coursecatalogue.au.dk>) – it is important to stick to them!
 - The compulsory activities are not graded and do not form part of the overall assessment for the course
 - However students must complete them in order to participate in the final exam
- Grading is based **exclusively** on the final 4-hour take-home exam
- **Exam date and time:** Friday after last class: 9 AM -1 PM CEST, in wiseflow
 - You have to be available for clarifying questions during the first hour (phone or email)
- **Deadline for sending exam questions:** June 1st to summeruniversityguestlecturers@au.dk

- **It is your responsibility to monitor the students' fulfillment of the relevant prerequisites according to your exam type**
 - Notify summeruniversityguestlecturers@au.dk if a student does not fulfill
- If “prerequisites for examination participation” not fulfilled:
 - Submit a critical reflection over the course's curriculum. The report should be entitled “Theoretical reflections on [course title]” and amount to max. 22,000 characters
 - The report's content should be meaningful for the prerequisite to be fulfilled, but will not be subject to a grade
 - AU Summer University team is checking if the report qualifies for exam participation



RE-EXAMS

- “Danish” students have a legal right to three exam attempts and we must therefore offer them the opportunity to do a re-take exam **if they fail or are unable to participate in the ordinary exam**
 - The format is a **take-home exam of maximum 36.000 characters** (including blanks), which corresponds to approx. 15 pages
 - **1 week** to complete the re-exam – think about that when formulating the exam questions
- **Dates for the first retake:** October 13th 2023 @ 12.00 (noon) to October 20th 2023 12.00 @ (noon), in WISEflow
- **Dates for the second retake:** February 1st 2024 @ 12.00 (noon) to February 8th 2024 @ 12.00 (noon), in WISEflow

AU'S STANCE ON AI CHATBOTS IN EXAMS

It is **not permitted** to use AI chatbots, such as ChatGPT or similar software, during exams at Aarhus University – **even exams that permit the use of exam aids**

- Difficult to check and prove that e.g. chatGPT has been used
- Please, flag all cases where you get the feeling that “something is not right here”, AU will take it from there

WHAT CAN YOU DO?

Think about the exam questions carefully

- with the right prompts, chatGPT can do an OK job at answering questions about broader, more generic topics and/or established theories

Suggestions:

- Use (longer) cases with questions that require a certain degree of analysis (as opposed to more generic questions)
- Draw on current events (ideally not older than 12-18 months)
- Ask questions that refer to activities in the classroom (e.g. examples/cases)
- Require answers to refer to the curriculum
- Combine different kinds of material, e.g. texts with images and/or graphs

USING AI CHATBOTS IN TEACHING

- AU has no explicit stance on this, yet 😊
- What does it mean?
 - Using AI chatbots, like chatGPT, is allowed but is not requested (or expected)
- Good practice would be:
 - Take an explicit stance about the use of AI chatbots in your course
 - e.g. whether you will use it and/or expect them to use it, and if so for which activities and parts of the learning process
 - Communicate it explicitly to the students in the beginning of your course
 - Most students are resilient if we make clear what the expectations are!
 - Remember that students come from all over the world, hence their knowledge of/exposure to/ability to use AI chatbots is likely to vary greatly

THE DANISH GRADING SCALE

	Grade	Description	ECTS
5 passing grades	12	For an excellent performance displaying a high level of command of all aspects of the relevant material, with no or only a few minor weaknesses.	A
	10	For a very good performance displaying a high level of command of most aspects of the relevant material, with only minor weaknesses.	B
	7	For a good performance displaying good command of the relevant material but also some weaknesses.	C
	4	For a fair performance displaying some command of the relevant material but also some major weaknesses.	D
	02	For a performance meeting only the minimum requirements for acceptance.	E
2 failing grades	00	For a performance which does not meet the minimum requirements for acceptance.	Fx
	-3	For a performance which is unacceptable in all respects.	F

The Danish grading scale is an **ABSOLUTE** scale

- grades are not normalized
- we aim at a somewhat normal distribution, even though grades are not normalized
- think carefully about the exam questions and level of difficulty



EXAMS AND GRADING

- Crucial to remember to stick with your course description
 - Grade should reflect the student's **ability to fulfill the learning goals**
 - E.g.: the ability to fulfill the learning goals is good with some weaknesses = 7
- **One final grade** is given
 - Grading is only based on the exam submission and is an overall assessment
- Students may receive feedback on assignments/specific exam questions, but not grades for each individual assignment/exam question (since there is only one grade)
 - Refrain from giving students indicative or partial grades
- No group grades
 - Important to be able to individualize a student's performance

FEEDBACK

FEEDBACK ON ASSIGNMENTS

- Feedback is strongly encouraged
- It can take many forms:
 - Oral and/or in writing
 - Individual feedback for each student
 - Group feedback (smaller groups or the whole class)
 - Peer feedback from fellow students
- Formative rather than summative

UPON PUBLICATION OF GRADES

Requests for feedback:

- Students have the right to get feedback on their exams
- We expect that feedback on the exam is provided if asked for
 - You can also e.g. upload a guided solution on Brightspace if you wish
- It is ok to explain the grade to the student but you must NOT change the grade

Student complaints:

- If a student thinks that the grade is unfair, s.he can file a formal complain
- Contact/refer students to the Summer University Administration
