

Language policy at the Faculty of Arts after new exam ministerial order: consequences for language of teaching and examinations

The new exam ministerial order valid from 1 September 2022 does not necessitate changes to the language policy at the faculty of Arts. It must therefore still be ensured that information about the language of teaching and examinations in [the course catalogue](#) is correct for each of the courses offered.

The language of teaching must be stated in the course catalogue no later than 1 April and 1 October. The rules regarding the language of exams are stated in the academic regulations. These rules mean that the language of each exam is linked closely to the language of teaching in the course concerned and the type of degree programme in question. The table below shows the connection between the language of teaching and the language of exams in the various types of degree programme.

Rules for agreements with teacher (cf. section 2.1 of the academic regulations):

- The teacher can comply with a request by students to take exams in Danish, even though the teaching has been done in English (and vice versa). Compliance applies to everyone on the course concerned.
- The teacher is not obliged to agree to do the exam in languages other than the language stated in the course catalogue for the course in question. If there is any doubt about this, the teacher may ask the head of department to settle the issue.
- If language proficiency is one of the academic objectives of the course, the teacher cannot allow the students to take the exam in any language other than the language studied (and maybe Danish in for instance translation courses).
- The teacher is responsible for registering the correct examination language when grades are awarded.

Reasons for refusing student requests for specific examination languages

- Any refusal must be based on academic or linguistic reasons (for instance if the academic content requires the use of a particular language, or if the teacher does not have sufficient ability in the language in question, or if agreement gives rise to any inequality between the students in the exam situation).

Fixed practice

- The head of department may decide that a fixed practice should be adopted, provided that this practice is in compliance with the rules. The degree programme board may recommend a specific practice to the head of department.

Courses which have more than one examination language, or which take place at more than one campus (Aarhus/Emdrup)

If the same course is taught by more than one teacher^{vii}, the teaching sometimes takes place in both Danish and English. In such cases, the students can choose which language they want to be examined in. So the examination language must not depend on the specific question which the student draws for an oral exam.

Courses on degree programmes which are conducted at more than one campus are treated as separate courses. This means that a course might be conducted in Danish at the Emdrup campus but in English at the Aarhus campus. In such cases, the exam will be conducted in Danish in Emdrup and English in Aarhus, unless the student reaches any other agreement with the teacher.

i Degree programmes in Danish with language proficiency in Danish

Scandinavian Studies, Didactics (Danish).

ii Degree programmes in modern languages

China Studies, Japan Studies, India and South Asia Studies, Arab and Islamic Studies, Brazilian Studies, French, Spanish, Italian, German and IBC-English.

iii Degree programmes in classical languages

Classical Archaeology, Classical Languages (including Greek, Latin and Classical Studies), Theology and the Study of Religion.

iv List of degree programmes accredited in English, including programmes requiring language proficiency in English

MA in Anthropology (English lines), MA in Human Security, MA in Sustainable Heritage Management, MA in European Studies, BA, BA supplementary subject, MA supplementary subject and MA in English, BA in Cognitive Science, MA in Cognitive Science, MA in Intercultural Studies, MA in Religious Roots, MA in Journalism and Media, MA in LAICS, MA in Curating, MA in Linguistics.

v Degree programmes approved in English with proficiency in foreign languages

MA in Intercultural Studies (French, German and Spanish).

vi Bachelor's supplementary subjects conducted in English

Addressing Global Challenges, Contemporary Communication in English, Critical Data Studies, Cultural and Creative Industries, Cultural Data Science, Social Minds, Sociology, Bachelor's supplementary subject in Strategic Communication in Organisations (English line).

vii In this connection, a “course” means any course/module in the academic regulations (these may be divided depending on the campus concerned). Courses sometimes involve more than one teacher for the same group of students (several teachers for one group), or several parallel classes with one or more teachers for each class (several teachers for several groups). The latter situation occurs in particular in large degree programmes and groups of elective courses.
